OUT OF STATE PROFESSIONAL LICENSURE POLICY

In accordance with U.S. Department of Education requirements, Standard Healthcare Services, College of Nursing provides information to enrolled and prospective students regarding whether completion of the Practical Nursing Program and the LPN to RN Transition Program is sufficient to meet state education requirements for licensure. Standard College provides a list of all States for which the school has determined that it (a) meets state educational requirements for licensure or certification in the state, (b) does not meet state educational requirements for licensure or certification in the state , or (c) Standard College has not made a determination that its curriculum meets the State educational requirements for licensure or certification in the state.

For states where a determination has not been made, students and prospective students are advised to contact the appropriate state licensing board. Contact information for each state licensing board is provided to support informed decision-making.

This information is disclosed to prospective and enrolled students prior to enrollment, during the admission process, and throughout the duration enrollment. Before students submit a Practical Nursing Program or LPN to RN Transition Program application, they are informed that “Standard College has determined that its curriculum meets the state educational requirements for licensure or certification in all states EXCEPT Alaska, Maine, and Vermont.” This statement is written at the top of the application under the section that states “Please carefully read this important information before submitting the application.” At the mandatory orientation in both programs, students are required to sign the Professional Licensure Disclosure Form. The Out of State Professional Licensure Policy is published in an addendum to the 2025–2026 Handbook/Catalog ,which students have access to at any point in time.

Standard College advises students and prospective students to contact the licensing board for the states the school has not been able to make a determination regarding state professional licensure requirements, and provides the current state licensing board contact information for those states.

Additionally, the College monitors student location in accordance with its Physical Location Policy. If a student relocates to a state where the program does not meet educational requirements for licensure, the College provides direct written notification within 14 days of the determination. The College also notifies students within 14 days if there is any change in the program’s determination regarding state licensure requirements.

The program will enroll prospective students who are physically located in a state where the institution has determined the program does not meet the state educational requirements for licensure or credentialing with the requirement that the student provides a signed and dated attestation (1) confirming receipt of a disclosure from the institution about the program’s eligibility for licensure or

credentialing in the student's current state, (2) specifying the specific state that the student intends to move to for work post-graduation, and (3) confirming that the program does satisfy the educational requirements for licensure in that specific state.

If an enrolled student relocated to a state described in (b.), Standard College will provide direct notice that completion of that program would not be sufficient to meet licensure or certification within 14 days after a determination that the student's location has changed to another state. Standard College will additionally disclose to students, within 14 days, if it has determined that the program no longer satisfies the original determination of meeting state requirements made at the time of enrollment.
